# For Fun: The infancy Gospel of Thomas<sup>12</sup>

Attributed to Thomas the Israelite, the philosopher A 'Gospel' that describes the childhood of Jesus, dated late 2<sup>nd</sup> Century, and certainly not part of the Bible

sources: There are three primary sources for the infancy gospel are two Greek versions, and a Latin version. The version we can access online is a composite of these three. It is impossible to tell what the original language would have been.

Motive: Many stories, about Jesus and the saints have been made up over the years, for a number of motives.

In some cases the stories are constructed to emphasise the holy nature of the subject. In some cases the stories are constructed, expanded or spread widely for political/social purposes.

In some cases the stories are created out of faithful curiosity, in order to 'fill in the blanks'

3 miracles,

a failed attempt to teach Jesus,

3 miracles.

Visit to the Temple (Luke 2.41-52)

Repeated twice


