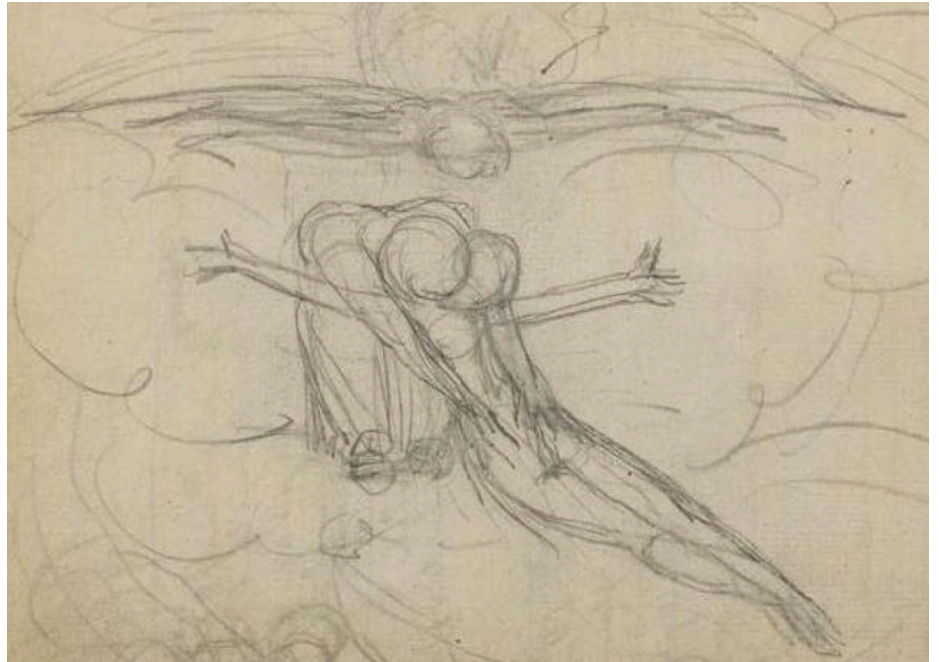


<b>Ruach/ Pneuma/ Spirit</b>	<b>Nephesh/ psuche/ Soul</b>
<p><b>7307</b> ruwach roo'-akh from <a href="#">7306</a>; wind; by resemblance breath, i.e. a sensible (or even violent) exhalation; figuratively, life, anger, unsubstantiality; by extension, a region of the sky; by resemblance spirit, but only of a rational being (including its expression and functions)</p>	<p><b>5314</b> naphash naw-fash' a primitive root; to breathe; passively, to be breathed upon, i.e. (figuratively) refreshed (as if by a current of air): <b>5315</b> nephesh neh'-fesh from <a href="#">5314</a>; properly, a breathing creature, i.e. animal of (abstractly) vitality; used very widely in a literal, accommodated or figurative sense</p>
<p><b>4151.</b> <i>pneuma pnyoo'-mah</i> from 4154; a current of air, i.e. breath (blast) or a breeze; by analogy or figuratively, a spirit, i.e. (human) the rational soul, (by implication) vital principle, mental disposition, etc., or (superhuman) an angel, demon, or (divine) God, Christ's spirit, the Holy Spirit:--ghost, life, spirit(-ual, -ually), mind.</p>	<p><b>5590.</b> <i>psuche psoo-khay'</i> from 5594; breath, i.e. (by implication) spirit, abstractly or concretely (the animal sentient principle only; thus distinguished from 4151, which is the rational and immortal soul;</p>
